Criteria wise Summary

Curricular Aspects:

Sree Ayyappa College, affiliated with the University of Kerala, offers a diverse range of educational opportunities, including six undergraduate programs under the Choice Based Credit System and one postgraduate program. The annual prospectus provides comprehensive information about the programs. The College Academic Calendar prepared in accordance with University Academic and Examination Calendar ensures efficient implementation of the curriculum, while faculty collaborates on lesson plans. CLMC prepares master time table for the smoothening of the curriculum and common time table for conducting internal examinations.

The college supports students' academic growth through various initiatives, such as NPTEL courses, WWS, SSP, Orientation programs, Bridge courses, Tutorial classes, Remedial classes, and Seminars. Over the last five years, the college has conducted 15 certificate/value added/add on/skill development courses, providing a strong academic flexibility for the institution.

The college prioritizes the use of technology in teaching and learning, and the library offers essential resources. Continuous evaluation methods are employed, and the IQAC oversees curriculum development. Our institution takes pride in its commitment to addressing diverse societal issues through its curriculum.

The college emphasizes Gender Sensitivity, offering courses and awareness programs to empower and celebrate women. Environment and Sustainability are prioritized with compulsory Environmental Science Courses, eco-conscious clubs, and green initiatives. Professional Ethics are ingrained in various departments, promoting principles like IPR and Food Safety. Human Values are fostered through social activities, creating socially responsible individuals. College supprts the students to undergo interships as part their project works.

The college's efforts have been recognized with esteemed awards, showcasing its dedication to social responsibility. Through its holistic approach, Sree Ayyappa College shapes students to be conscientious and compassionate members of society.

Furthermore, we actively collect feedback from stakeholders, including students, alumni, teachers, and employers, to continually improve teaching and learning quality and enhance students' employability. Analysis reports are prepared based on the responses, and these are presented in the meetings of IQAC/CLMC/College Council for necessary actions of improvement.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation:

Sree Ayyappa College offers six different undergraduate (UG) programs, and one postgraduate (PG) program, catering to the academic needs of aspiring students in various disciplines. The average student intake of the institution is 153 and 68% of these seats were filled during the last five years Throughout the evaluation period, the college maintained an average student population of 420. On average 130 students attend their final semester examination every academic year and 60 is the average pass percentage.

The college has an impressive faculty strength, with an average of 35 experienced and qualified teachers during the evaluation period with all sanctioned posts filled. The student-faculty ratio at our institution stands at an admirable 11, indicating a healthy balance between the number of students and teachers. This ratio allows for personalized attention to students and facilitates effective academic mentoring. A notable percentage of the college's full-time faculty members possess advanced qualifications as approximately 68% of the full-time teachers have NET/SET/SLET/Ph.D.

To promote ICT-enabled teaching and learning, the institution is provided with smart classrooms, a College LMS facility, an institution GSuite account, and an improved student-computer ratio.

We emphasize the importance of Program Outcomes (POs), Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs) as integral components of the curriculum assessment process. By displaying these outcomes through multiple channels, the college promotes understanding, collaboration, and accountability among all stakeholders. Efforts were taken to evaluate the attainment of POs, PSOs, and COs using direct and indirect methods.

The Student Satisfaction Surveys conducted at the end of the academic year play a crucial role in evaluating the teaching-learning process and overall educational experience at the college. These surveys help us to identify the strength and weaknesses of the institution and to constantly improve the quality of the teaching and evaluation process.

Research, Innovations and Extension:

Our institution actively engages in progressive research by collaborating with various research institutes and promoting a robust research culture. During the assessment period, the college received Rs. 22.23 Lakhs as research grants from the funding agency KSCSTEC. In 2019, the Centre for Innovation and Entrepreneurship (CIE) was established, creating an ecosystem for innovation. The college has also organized several programs to explore holistic well-being through Ayurveda. Moreover, the college actively participates in the Young Innovators Programme (YIP) 2020-2022, initiated by K-Disc, Govt of Kerala, which encourages young minds to develop a passion for science and find solutions to global challenges.

During the assessment year, the faculties published 51 research papers enlisted in UGC care and produced 89 edited books/chapters with ISBN numbers. The institution conducted 107 seminars/workshops and 7 conferences, providing valuable networking opportunities with specialists from various sectors. The National Intellectual Property Mission (NIPAM) of the Indian government's Ministry of Commerce and Industry recognized the college for promoting awareness of intellectual property rights (IPR).

To achieve numerous Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), the institution carefully planned and executed extension activities. These activities were carried out in surrounding communities to educate students on important social concerns. The college conducted 141 extension and outreach programs. In recognition of its efforts, the NSS unit of the college received the Best Unit of Kerala University award in 2019, and a best volunteer award in 2020. The Swachh Bharat Mission Ministry of Youth Affairs awarded the institute with a cash prize of Rs 10,000 for the year 2019. Additionally, the Bhoomithra Sena Club of our college was recognized by the Department of Environment and Climate Change, Govt of Kerala, with a Cash award for being the best BMC. The college also received national recognition for its participation in WWF and ECHO Projects presentations in the years 2020 and 2021, respectively. Furthermore, the college received the Best Project presentation award in 2021 at the Periyar Congress Conducted by the Department of Wildlife and Forestry. The college has 25 functional MoUs, collaborations, and linkages with reputed institutions for research, faculty and student exchange, internships, on-the-job training, industrial visits, etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

The college is situated on an expansive campus covering approximately 11.856 acres of land with a well-constructed built-up area spanning 7882 square meters. This includes 20 well-furnished classrooms, equipped with whiteboards, green boards, and necessary furniture. This includes smart classrooms for final-year degree students and postgraduate students with advanced features such as smart boards, LCD projectors, and Wi-Fi connectivity. There are 11 fully functional laboratories equipped with state-of-the-art apparatus and tools, allowing students to gain practical knowledge and hands-on experience in their respective fields of study. The college library, fully automated with modern systems such as KOHA and DSpace, has a diverse collection of 8641 books, catering to various academic disciplines and interests. The college offers 9 high-speed broadband connections, ensuring that students and faculty can readily access online resources and carry out research with ease. The college houses 94 machines exclusively for student use, resulting in an impressive student-to-computer ratio of approximately 4:1.

The college auditorium spans an area of 1350 square feet and is well-equipped with a permanent platform, audio-visual aids, music systems, speakers, microphones, and podiums. It can accommodate up to 200 individuals, making it suitable for various events and functions.

The college is well-prepared to handle the examination process with the inclusion of high-end printers featuring RADF (Reverse Automatic Document Feeder) functionality. Additionally, a barcode scanner is employed to efficiently manage the examination section, streamlining the process of recording and organizing examination-related documents.

We also offer an indoor gymnasium facility, featuring high-grade instruments for a comprehensive body workout. Furthermore, analytical instruments such as weighing scales, stadiometers, and pulse analyzers are available to promote a holistic approach to fitness. The college provides ample space and facilities for both indoor and outdoor games. Indoor games such as Table Tennis, Carrom, and Chess are available for recreational activities. For outdoor sports enthusiasts, the college offers facilities for games like Cricket, Football, Volleyball, etc., fostering a healthy and active student community.

Over the last five years, the college has demonstrated a considerable focus on infrastructure development and maintenance, investing a total of 87.63 lakhs, excluding salaries.

The institution has provided scholarships and freeships to 71% of its students, with support from teachers, Alumni Association, College PTA, government, non-government bodies, industries, and individuals. The college has a well-defined institutional scholarship policy.

To enhance students' capabilities, the college organized 54 capacity development and skills enhancement activities, focusing on soft skills, language and communication skills, life skills (including yoga, physical fitness, health, and hygiene), and ICT/computing skills.

During the last five years, 42% of students benefited from 27 different programs on career guidance, awareness, orientation, motivation, and placement drives. The institution conducted seminars on competitive examinations and career counseling.

The college achieved a commendable 66% placement rate for outgoing students and students progressing to higher education in the last five years. Moreover, 13% of students qualified in various state/national/international level examinations during the same period.

Sree Ayyappa College's students received recognition in sports and cultural activities, winning 42 awards/medals at the university, state, national, and international levels. Also, the college encourages student participation in sports and cultural programs, with students participating in 138 events during the last five years.

It was a great achievement that we could register our College Alumni Association (ALP/TC35/2023) during this period of evaluation. The alumni association plays a vital role in the college's development by keeping former students and staff connected through regular meetings, providing scholarships to needy students, and conducting workshops.

To address student grievances, including cases of sexual harassment and ragging, the college follows statutory/regulatory guidelines, organizes awareness programs, provides online/offline grievance submission mechanisms, and ensures timely redressal through appropriate committees. The college adopts a zero-tolerance policy towards ragging and sexual harassment to create a safe and respectful learning environment.

Governance, Leadership and Management:

Sree Ayyappa College's institutional governance and leadership are closely aligned with its vision and mission of 'Transcending barriers through knowledge and service' and 'To be an instrument for the rural youth to attain holistic development'. The institution focuses on empowering rural youth, especially young women, to become responsible and sensitive citizens.

We follow a democratic approach to decision-making, involving various committees and stakeholders in the process.

Sree Ayyappa College is effectively deployed and functioning under the oversight of the Travancore Devaswom Board. The college is managed by the Secretary to the Devaswom Board, while the Principal serves as the executive head, overseeing day-to-day operations. it effectively functions within its institutional perspective plan, ensuring efficient administrative setup, appointment procedures, and adherence to service rules. The collaborative approach among its governing bodies enables the institution to achieve its broader vision and goals while maintaining a strong commitment to academic excellence and overall development.

The college has effective strategies for mobilizing and utilizing resources and funds from various sources. The institution receives funds from government bodies like UGC, KSCSTE, State NSS cell, and State/Central Govt. funding agencies, as well as non-government sources like Management (TDB), PTA, etc.

Above all. the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been instrumental in institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes at Sree Ayyappa College. It has fostered a culture of excellence in both

academic and administrative aspects since the completion of the initial accreditation cycle in January 2017. Institutional preparedness for NEP	

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Sree Ayyappa College offers three undergraduate programs that follow a multidisciplinary curriculum pattern, providing students with a diverse range of knowledge and career opportunities. The BSc Biochemistry and Industrial Microbiology program combines the fields of biochemistry and industrial microbiology. The curriculum also includes complementary courses in chemistry and language studies. This multidisciplinary approach allows students to pursue postgraduate studies in various disciplines such as biochemistry, biotechnology, industrial microbiology, computational biology, and medical microbiology. The B.A English and Media Studies program integrates the study of English and media. Students gain skills in media studies and also learn about informatics and social media ethics. The multidisciplinary curriculum opens avenues for postgraduate studies in English, mass communication, journalism, and media studies. The B.Com Commerce with Computer Applications program merges conventional commerce subjects with computer applications. This multidisciplinary curriculum enables students to pursue postgraduate studies in disciplines such as commerce, business administration, and computer applications. The integration of commerce and computer applications creates placement opportunities in various fields of study. Multidisciplinary approaches are also incorporated into the BSc Computer Science and BSc Electronics programs. The BSc Computer Science curriculum includes electronics courses, while the BSc Electronics curriculum includes computer science courses, including programming. This interdisciplinary approach broadens students' knowledge and skills in both computer science and electronics. All undergraduate programs include an open course during the fifth semester, allowing students to choose a course offered by another discipline based on their interests. Additionally, courses in environmental studies and disaster management are included in the curriculum, fostering a sense of environmental protection and conservation among students. In the postgraduate program, MSc Computer Science, interdisciplinary courses such as bioinformatics, artificial intelligence, and big data analytics are included in the syllabus. This further enhances the multidisciplinary approach and prepares students for advanced studies and research in computer science. Overall, Sree Ayyappa College's multidisciplinary curriculum equips students with a diverse skill set, expanding their career prospects and providing a well-rounded education that prepares them for the challenges of a dynamic and interconnected world.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) system at Sree Ayyappa College is

underway, although clear policies and guidelines from the affiliating University of Kerala are still pending. Despite this, our institution has taken proactive measures to kickstart the implementation process. As a first step, we have developed a comprehensive communication strategy to disseminate information about the ABC system to students, faculty, and other stakeholders. This includes raising awareness about the advantages of credit transfer and providing detailed guidance on the credit transfer process. To facilitate this, we have organized a highly informative webinar on the "Academic Bank of Credit Scheme" exclusively for faculty members and students. Through this webinar, we aim to ensure that everyone involved understands the ABC system thoroughly. In line with the digital advancements in education, we have integrated the ABC system into the DigiLocker framework. By leveraging this technology, we have communicated with our students, urging them to register in the ABC portal. We are pleased to share that the student registration process is currently underway, further solidifying our commitment to implementing the ABC system effectively. While we eagerly await the finalization of the criteria for credit transfer, credit valuation, and credit accumulation from the affiliating University, Sree Ayyappa College remains proactive in laying the groundwork for a smooth transition to the ABC system. We are dedicated to ensuring that our students benefit from the advantages of credit transfer and have access to a seamless credit accumulation process. As we move forward, we will continue to collaborate closely with the University of Kerala, advocating for clear policies and guidelines to enhance the implementation of the ABC system. Our collective efforts will enable students to navigate their academic journey more efficiently, fostering a flexible and comprehensive approach to higher education.

3. Skill development:

Sree Ayyappa College recognizes the importance of skill development programs in bridging the gap between theoretical teaching and industry applications, thus enhancing students' placement opportunities. "Employability Skill Training." program aims to equip students with essential skills highly valued by employers, including communication, problem-solving, teamwork, time management, leadership, and industry-specific knowledge. By participating in this program, students gain a competitive advantage in the job market. The joint effort of the Centre for Incubation and Entrepreneurship(CIE) and various departments has resulted in the commencement of many skill development/add-on/certificate/value-added courses on the campus. Various departments within the college offer specialized skill development courses.

The Department of Commerce conducts the "Global | Financial Markets and Instruments" course, providing students with analytical techniques and practical tools related to economic management and global financial markets. This knowledge enhances their understanding of financial systems, investment strategies, risk management, and economic trends. The Department of Mathematics organizes a skilloriented course on "Introduction to LATEX" This program enables students to effectively typeset their project reports, a compulsory requirement for completing their undergraduate programs successfully. Proficiency in LATEX enhances the presentation and formatting of their research work, making it more professional and visually appealing. Likewise, the "Mushroom Cultivation & Post Harvesting Technology" certificate course serves as a valuable skill development opportunity for students. By learning about different mushroom species, growth requirements, and the role of microorganisms, students gain hands-on experience in preparing substrates, monitoring growth, and understanding the symbiotic relationship between mushrooms and the environment. This program opens up career paths in mushroom farming, research, quality control, and entrepreneurship while fostering problem-solving and critical thinking skills. The add-on course "Radio Programme Production" offers a valuable skill development opportunity. Through this program, students gain practical knowledge in scriptwriting, audio editing, and storytelling for radio. It enhances their communication, adaptability, and audio production skills, providing career prospects in broadcasting, podcasting, journalism, and content creation. Students develop creativity and critical thinking abilities while understanding the power of audio as a medium of expression. The outreach society of the Electronics Department focuses on LED bulb assembling and distribution which provides practical knowledge and experience to students. This program focuses on LED components, circuit design, soldering techniques, and quality control. It develops skills in soldering, circuit analysis, and troubleshooting, offering career opportunities in LED manufacturing, lighting design, and research. The program also promotes innovation and sustainability in lighting solutions. Overall, the skill development programs and courses at Sree Ayyappa College equip students with practical skills, industry exposure, and specialized knowledge, significantly improving their employability. By integrating these programs into the curriculum, the college ensures that students are well-prepared to excel in their chosen fields and meet the demands of the job market.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The curriculum is designed in such a way as to use English as an international language, Hindi as the national language, and Malayalam as a state / regional language. The concepts are better understood by the students when the medium of instruction is in their mother tongue. Considering that the majority of students in our college are from socially and economically backward settings, the classroom teaching incorporates both English and regional language (Malayalam) to convey the ideas. To promote Indian Languages we celebrated Hindi Day and Malayalam Day. We promote Indian culture and values through the participation of students in university-level youth festivals. Students celebrate festivals like Onam, Christmas, and Holy on campus to impart religious harmony, cultivate a secular mindset, and get an insight into our cultural heritage. The college library is equipped with several textbooks for the integration of the Indian Knowledge System to promote cultural awareness and expression and to recognize the knowledge of the rich diversity of India.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Outcome-based education (OBE) helps to improve the quality of higher education. In view of this, our university is focusing on curriculum development in accordance with the OBE system. The UG and PG curriculum is designed by the University on OBE mode to include Programme Outcomes(POs), Programme Specific Outcomes(PSOs), and Course Outcomes(COs). The PG program syllabus is designed to include 10 POs, 6 PSOs, and 5 to 10 COs/courses. The POs, PSOs, and COs of each program are uploaded to the College Website. The POs and PSOs are well explained to the students during the Orientation Programme conducted soon after the admission procedure. The COs along with the syllabus is circulated among the students at the commencement of each course. The seminar topics and assignment questions are framed according to the COs. The lesson plans are also prepared accordingly. The attainments of the COs are evaluated by mapping the marks scored by each student with respect to the COs associated with the questions in the internal examinations. Since the University of Kerala has not shifted to a CO-based examination system, attainment of COs in the external examinations is not possible to be evaluated. Remedial measurements on the basis of attainment of COs are implemented by the institution. Attainment of PSOs and POs are partially evaluated on the basis of result analysis and placements of students
6. Distance education/online education:	Due to the Covid-19 pandemic situation online mode of education was adopted for the academic year 2020-21, and as the situation was extended to the academic year 2021-22, our College adopted a

hybrid mode of teaching and learning by combining online and offline sessions adhering to the orders issued from time to time by UGC and the Government of Kerala. To enhance the online teaching facility College introduced a new LMS software 'SAC Campus Genie' to cope with the tremendous requirement while handling online sessions. The software has different modules to manage faculty, student, and parent portals. Faculty members were provided with different roles like Principal, HoD, Faculty, Faculty Advisor, and ERP Coordinator to manage the required data and documents. Various academic reports based on faculty lesson plans, subject coverage, result analysis, attendance analysis, feedback collection, and analysis, students' mentoring sessions, and remedial classes can be prepared at a single click in this system. In addition to the SAC LMS(Campus Genie) platform, Google Classroom, and Google Meet in College Gsuite account, Faculty YouTube channels, online examination tools like ClassMarker, social media platforms like Whatsapp, Telegram, and Gmail groups are widely used to implement online sessions effectively. Seminars, workshops, virtual lab sessions, and conferences are also conducted in online mode. Our college has been established as a Local Chapter of SWAYAM NPTEL thus promoting online courses among our students.

The principal organizes the meeting of the teaching staff at the commencement of the academic year. Faculty members develop lesson plans using **Campus Genie** (College LMS) based on the academic calendar and exam schedule. Academic matters, such as lesson plans, portion completion status, continuous assessment marks, and student attendance, are discussed in Department Level Monitoring Committee (DLMC) and CLMC meetings. Stakeholder feedback analysis is addressed in CLMC meetings, leading to necessary actions. **PTA** meetings are organized to foster strong academic connections and interactive dynamics among students, teachers, and parents.

Our parent university has made Environmental Science a compulsory credit course for all U.G. Second Year students. B.Sc. Electronics have a section in the second semester addressing the topic of energy-efficient LEDs, and clean power generation through solar photovoltaics. Our college actively fosters environmental consciousness through student clubs like "Bhoomithra" and "Biodiversity," Additionally, we offer an add-on course and field visits dedicated to environmental sustainability. Our campus is equipped with a Rain Harvesting plant, and we enthusiastically observed events like World Environment Day, World Ozone Day, etc. marked by awareness campaigns, tree-planting drives, etc. The college also organizes seminars/ webinars on Energy and the Environment, the Student Solar Ambassador project, and the concept of going green. Moreover, the college conducts green and energy audits and promotes green protocols, such as minimizing plastic and waste.

Professional Ethics:

Our college places a strong emphasis on integrating professional ethics and human values across the curriculum. For example, the **Biochemistry and Industrial Microbiology** department's curriculum includes subjects like **Professional Ethics, Intellectual Property Rights (IPR), Plagiarism, and Food Safety.** The college organized expert talks on "Professional Ethics" and webinars on IPR to further emphasize these principles. A Policy Guidelines for **Code of Conduct** is also followed and it is displayed on the college website.

Furthermore, the fifth semester's component of Social Service and Extension activities, namely the NSS and the College clubs programs, requires students to complete 40 hours to earn two credits. The college also celebrates days of national importance, such as Independence Day, Republic Day, Gandhi Jayanti, etc., to imbibe national values in the students.

The curriculum of the Computer Science (B.Sc.) department has a section on value education to understand the impacts of disaster and the features of the constitution of India. Our students actively participate in various social activities including Varattar river cleaning drives, village adoption under UBA and NSS, Palliative Care, Vimukhthi, Covid awareness programs, AIDS awareness programs, Human Rights Day and special lecture on the Indian constitution. These activities contribute to shaping compassionate and socially responsible individuals.

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

The institution adopts a three-tier mechanism to ensure transparency and robustness in terms of frequency and mode of the mechanism of internal /external assessment. The College also holds a three-tier grievance redressal mechanism on department level, college level and University level, which has been clearly mentioned in the college academic calendar.

During each academic year, three meetings are constituted - Department Level Monitoring Committee (DLMC), College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC), and University Level Monitoring Committee (ULMC).

As per university guidelines the student performance is assessed based on assignments (to analyse their research and writing skills), seminars (communication and presentation skills), internal exams (to assess knowledge levels).

Frequency of internal assessment:

- Internal Exam Once a Semester
- Project As per the syllabus guidelines
- Seminar/Assignment- Once a Semester
- Model Exam Once a Semester

Transparent mode of assessment:

- The tentatively decided dates for conducting internal examination and model examination are published in the academic calendar.
- The finally decided dates of exams are announced in CLMC meeting and the respective DLMCs announce those dates in their departments.
- Model examination question papers are set in the University examination format for equipping the students for their final exams
- A list of examination invigilators is prepared and published for ensuring a university examination ambience for students who will later be appearing for university examinations. The respective Heads of the departments, CLMC convenor and class teachers oversee the conduct of exams.
- Distribution of students' progress reports and further discussion with parents regarding their ward's marks during PTA meetings

Grievance Redressal Mechanism

• Online classes related: The students raised complaints regarding internet data connectivity issues during their online examinations as their data availability was minimal.

Redressal: The departments and the NSS offered new mobiles and data recharging to the deserving students.

• Question paper related: There were instances when students complained about external exam questions asked from outside the prescribed syllabus. Redressal: The error will be notified to the concerned authorities to address them at the time of evaluation.

• Study time related: As the internal exams are conducted on regular working days with one hour duration, students raised objections demanding a day off to prepare for the next day exams.

Redressal: As per the mandates of the university, as there is no provision for allotting a day off on regular working days, teachers help students to revise the portions.

• Examination related: Any grievances relating to the conduct of examinations may be reported to the concerned teacher and further to the tutor, HOD, and Principal

Redressal: Provision for reconducting exam is available. And if necessary, external exam related grievances are forwarded to the university from the examination section.

• Valuation related: Any grievances relating the conduct of examinations or valuation of answer scripts may be reported to the concerned teacher and further to the Class-in-charge, HOD, and Principal.

Redressal: Provision for revaluation is available

• Attendance related: The monthly attendance and consolidated attendance are published on department notice boards and the concerned class WhatsApp groups.

Redressal: Complaints regarding attendance are addressed and resolved after collecting medical certificates or other relevant documents, if any.

The attainment of Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) is a crucial aspect of evaluating the effectiveness of an educational program. This evaluation provides evidence of how well the students have achieved the desired learning outcomes.

The evaluation process adopted by Sree Ayyappa Colege involves the following steps:

Publication of Program-Specific Outcomes (PSOs), Program Outcomes (POs), and Course Outcomes (COs): The college has published the outcomes of each Programme on the College Website: (Ref: https://www.sreeayyappacollege.ac.in/Programme_Outcomes_and_Course_Outcomes) and they are been made familiarized to students of each batch by the concerned faculty in charge.

Assessment Measures: Two assessment methods are used by the college to evaluate the attainment of PO, PSOs, and COs. They are

- 1. Direct Assessment Methods
- 2. Indirect Assessment Methods

In direct assessment methods, the marks obtained by students are the primary data used for the calculation part. University has not implemented an outcome-based evaluation for its end-semester examinations. Hence our College Level Monitoring Committee(CLMC) has initiated steps for implementing this assessment, based on the marks scored by students in their internal evaluation methods like class tests, model examinations, assignments, seminars, and practical tests. Mapping of marks to Course Outcomes is tabulated for the model examinations, class tests, seminars, and assignments. The questions included in the internal evaluation methods are first mapped to the COs of the concerned courses' syllabi. The model examination, class test, assignment marks, and test marks are included in this assessment. Mapping of Course Outcomes(COs) with Programme Outcomes(POs) and Programme Specific Outcomes(PSOs) are tabulated for each course of those programmes where POs and COs are clearly stated in the syllabus by the University. The strength of Correlation contributed by each COs of a particular Course to each POs and PSOs can be understood from the mapping table.

In indirect assessment, University results, Semester Progress reports, students' placement data, and students' progression reports are incorporated to assess the attainments of POs and PSOs. The analysis of

the feedback collected from students, alumni, and employers is another tool for the indirect assessments of POs and PSOs. The ranks obtained by students in various entrance examinations, and academic achievements of alumni also are considered as supporting documents for indirect assessments. The responses obtained from curriculum-specific queries included in the Students Satisfaction Survey(SSS) are yet another measure of indirect evaluation.

Evaluation Criteria: Benchmarks or criteria were established to determine the level of attainment for each outcome. The target for CO achievement is above 35% for degree students and above 40% for PG students as set by University for a course pass. The following RUBRICS scale is adopted to define the strength of correlation between the course outcomes (COs) mapped with Program outcomes (POs) /Programme specific outcomes (PSOs): High-Level Correlation -3, Moderate – 2, Low level 1, No correlation 0.

Spread across a sprawling campus, Sree Ayyappa College offers a host of facilities to ensure an enriching academic experience. With 20 well-furnished and spacious classrooms, equipped with modern amenities, the college provides an ideal environment for academic, curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities. Each department is equipped with multiple laboratories that enable hands-on learning opportunities for students. Additionally, the college boasts a women's hostel to cater to the accommodation needs of students.

The postgraduate and final year undergraduate classrooms are equipped with ICT facilities, including LAN internet connectivity, smart boards, green boards, LCD projectors, white screens for effective curriculum transactions, and CCTV cameras for security purposes. These technologically enabled classrooms create an engaging and interactive learning environment. Moreover, all the classrooms are well-lit, combining natural and electrical lighting systems to ensure optimal visibility. This facilitates both traditional teaching methods using chalk and dusters as well as modern ICT-enabled teaching approaches. Laptops are available to support ICT-based teaching, and the college possesses a licensed G Suite account for online teaching and recorded meetings.

In consideration of differently-abled students, preference is given to allocating classrooms on the ground floor to meet their specific requirements. The college houses a total of 11 fully functional laboratories, each well-equipped with the necessary instruments to provide hands-on experience to undergraduate students. M.Sc. Computer Science students have access to high-quality server computers in these labs for their research purposes. Additionally, all computer labs are equipped with the required software, and the Physics laboratory includes a darkroom facility.

For cultural activities, the college provides an auditorium that serves as a venue for competitions, performances, seminars, workshops, guidance sessions, and practices. The auditorium is equipped with a permanent platform, audio-visual aids, music systems, speakers, microphones, and podiums. It covers an area of 1350 square feet and can accommodate up to 200 individuals. The college offers indoor gymnasium facilities. It is equipped with high-grade instruments for a comprehensive body workout, including abdominal benches, barbells, bench presses, cable crossover pulleys, dumbbells with varying weights, treadmills, pull-up and push-up bars. Analytical instruments such as weighing scales, stadiometers, and pulse analyzers are also available. Facilities are provided for indoor games such as Table tennis, Carrom, and Chess and also for outdoor games like Cricket, Football, Volleyball, etc. Furthermore, yoga training sessions are conducted for both students and staff members.

The institution has implemented LMS Software named 'Campus Genie' during the academic year 2021-22. It was implemented to maintain the LMS platform for all departments to assist faculty members to manage admission registration, attendance, lesson plan, examinations, feedback on curriculum aspects, and other academic-related activities.

These comprehensive facilities at Sree Ayyappa College cater to the holistic development of students, providing an enabling environment for academic pursuits, cultural activities, and physical fitness. The college's commitment to supporting diverse learning needs and fostering a well-rounded educational experience is evident in the range of facilities it offers.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Answer:

The College library is fully automated with Integrated Library Management Software (ILMS) - KOHA and DSpace. At present, the students and faculty found it easy to search the availability of books in the library in a user-friendly manner according to Title / Author / Publisher-based search. Emails and messages are forwarded to the students automatically for overdue, issue, return, or other notifications. Bar code technology is used in the library for the issue and return of books. The entry and exit are automated through an in-out management system. All functions like Issue-Return, Renewal, Reports Generation, Stock Verification, Federated Search for multiple databases, attendance, etc are automated. In addition, manual registers for entry, exit, issue, and return are also maintained as additional records. Initiatives like digital browsing facilities and the signing of MoU with ST Aloysius College, Edathua etc have helped to enhance the digital accessibility of the college library.

The library is automated with the software KOHA version 21.05 for the overall management of library operations. Our Library is available 24×7 and Dspace is used for the digital library which is also available always online at college library premises. Our library KOHA is available through the IP http://192.168.1.2:8001 and http://192.168.1.2:8080/xmlui/for Dspace. Books are classified according to Dewey Decimal Classification Scheme 22nd edition.

All faculty and students are provided with an INFLIBNET username and password to access the journals and e-books through computer or mobile. The INFLIBNET account is renewed every academic year and Orientation programmes on INFLIBNET usage for first-year students are conducted to promote the usage statistics.

The DSpace software is available at college and is used to store any type of digital material including documents such as reprints, technical reports, conference papers, books, thesis works, etc. This software is used for easy access to the materials, both by listing and searching.

On average the number of teachers and students using the library per day was 25.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

In order to cater to the growing needs of IT infrastructure for both faculty and students, the College has consistently upgraded its IT facilities. These upgrades include enhancing memory configurations from 4 GB RAM to 16 GB RAM, updating the operating system from Windows 7 to 10, strengthening Wi-Fi connectivity, and providing free internet access to all members of the institution. The newly upgraded computers have been distributed among various department labs, the College library, browsing areas for students, as well as offices and departments for staff members. Additionally, all faculty members have been provided with G-suite accounts for their convenience.

During the academic year 2022-23, the college further improved its internet speed and expanded the number of internet connections. Four connections were upgraded to a speed of 200 Mbps from the previous 60 Mbps in October 2021. Subsequently, three new connections with a speed of 150 Mbps FTTH facility were introduced. As of now, the college boasts a total of nine internet connections. Furthermore, during the academic year 2022-23, a new internet connection with a speed of 150 Mbps was established in the Women's hostel.

The IT facility plays a significant role in administrative e-governance systems for finance, accounting, admission, and examination-related processes. The College library is equipped with INFLIBNET accounts on all computers, and faculty and students are provided with individual usernames and passwords to access INFLIBNET resources such as books and journals for academic purposes.

In keeping up with the digitalization trend, the University introduced an online question paper system in 2018-19. To support this initiative, the College procured a High-end printer with a RADF facility and a barcode scanner to efficiently manage the new Student Life Cycle Management (SLCM) system introduced by the University of Kerala.

Answer:

The functioning of the college is overseen by Travancore Devaswom Board. The Secretary to the Devaswom Board acts as the Manager of the college. Principal acts as the executive head of the institution, managing everyday undertakings of the institution.

Policies and Procedure: The Principal executes the decrees assigned by the Administering body in accordance with the standards specified by the Government and the University of Kerala. All the important strategies regarding the management and running of the institution are discussed and run by the College Council. Keeping in line with a wider vision and scope, the IQAC makes policies only after discussions and meetings with the members of the IQAC. The college website prominently showcases its exclusive policies and procedural directions, which are the cornerstone of its efficient functioning. These policies are later implemented by the departments, clubs, and committees as well as other helper bodies of the institution.

Administrative setup: The Principal at the beginning of the academic year conducts a staff meeting and selects teachers as conveners of various clubs and committees. A proceeding in this regard is released by the Principal. The proceedings of the Principal and the collaboration of faculty members are essential for the successful functioning of clubs, committees, and cells. They contribute to the overall growth and development of the teaching staff and the institution as a whole. Proceedings for nonteaching staff are released by assigning various duties. The Head Accountant manages the administration at the office level.

Appointment: Vacancies are reported to the DCE, Government of Kerala. Assistant Professors are appointed by strictly following the UGC guidelines and University regulations. The institution has

appointed seven new members during the period from 2017-2022.

The appointment of the non-teaching staff is done as per the criteria imposed by the Government and the University.

Likewise, the promotion of teachers is also based on the UGC regulations with respect to the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) and Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS). Of the teaching faculty, seven members have submitted their proposals to the university for promotion. As per the rule, four of the non-teaching staff were promoted during the period. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Answer:

The institution has effective welfare measures for the employees, most of them subject to Kerala Service Rules(KSR), which help them realize their full potential.

Performance Appraisal System: The performance of the teaching and non-teaching staff is evaluated following the rules and regulations of UGC, the University, and the Gov. of Kerala. When a promotion falls due for a faculty, a PBAS is submitted to the Principal. The self-appraisal report is submitted and evaluated by the IQAC and the IQAC via the Principal, requests the University to constitute a screening committee. The committee constitutes two subject experts appointed by the University, the Principal, and the Head of the Department. In the light of the assessment of his/her PBAS Performa, the reports from the screening committee, and the recommendation from the Manager of the institute, the proposal is submitted to the University. Four faculty members had presented their application for endorsement of advancement from Level 11 to 12 and the screening committee has sent the report to the University. One faculty member was granted promotion from Level 11 to 12 and the other two were promoted from 13A to 14. Four non-teaching staff were promoted in accordance with the regulations of the state government.

Welfare Measures for Teaching and Non-teaching Staff: The college has implemented several welfare measures to enhance the mental and physical health of its staff, boost their motivation, and enhance their critical thinking abilities. Teachers are actively encouraged to participate in various workshops, seminars, training programs, and refresher courses, and they are granted duty leave to do so. The PTA, along with the Management, provides salary advances to government guest lecturers and newly appointed staff members until they receive their salaries from the government. Supporting staff members receive financial assistance for medical treatments. The Staff Association offers assistance at both the University and the Office of the Deputy Director of Collegiate Education, providing services that benefit the entire college staff. Additionally, the Staff Association organizes staff tours and retreats every year to foster a positive atmosphere within the community. Teachers who achieve notable accomplishments in their respective fields are honored by the Staff Association.

Upon retirement, staff members are recognized and appreciated by the institution through the presentation of a memento during college-organized events. Female staff members are provided with hostel facilities upon request. The library and laboratory facilities are continuously upgraded to encourage research, and all teachers are granted access to free internet while at the college.

Following the guidelines of rules of the government, the college has implemented Provident Fund, Medi Claim, Pension Scheme, GIS, SLI, Medical Reimbursement, Medisep, Leave surrender, PF loan, Gratuity, DCRG, NPS, Maternity leave and Paternity leave. The institution has effective welfare measures for the employees, most of them subject to Kerala Service Rules(KSR), which help them realize their full potential.

Avenues for career development/progression:

- Organized Professional and Administrative training programs for skill enhancement to teaching and non-teaching staff.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Answer:

Strategies for mobilization: The institution has implemented a well-organized and transparent approach for mobilizing financial resources from both government and non-government sources. The main objective of the policy document for resource mobilization is to identify, the resources available for the various programs for efficient management of funds and to widen the resource base for the attainment of the set goals. The document outlines the procedures for the efficient utilization of generated funds.

Funds from various sources: The college receives funds mainly from UGC, KSCSTE, State NSS cell, State/Central Govt. funding agencies such as WWS, SSP and PTA, Management(TDB), etc. These designated teachers are authorized to mobilize and utilize funds allocated to their respective domains. This empowerment enables them to efficiently manage the resources and contribute to the growth and success of the institution's various initiatives.

Optimal utilization of resources: A purchase committee is constituted in the institute to determine fund allocation to each department. The fund allocated can be for different purposes ranging from purchasing books to modifying the infrastructure. Each department submits a proposal stating the needs and expenses and based on the proposals, the fund is distributed. The financial aid received from the state government is effectively used for the maintenance of various clubs of the college. The fund received from the management/PTA is used to give salary advances for the staff appointed on contract and other contributions are utilized to meet the developmental needs of the institution and for giving various scholarships to students.

For optimum utilization of the available resources, the stakeholders are informed about the sanctioned budget and are directed to keep a record of all the financial transactions. On behalf of the Principal, the Head Accountant maintains the accounts of all these financial transactions.

Financial Audits: The annual budget summary is prepared at the end of the financial year. The institution keeps a check on proofs of expenditure like receipts, so that it can be submitted with the prepared budget summary. These financial statements are verified by the Accountant General and the authorities in the Department of Collegiate Education at the time of final auditing. The institution keeps all the files organized and files regarding UGC or Government schemes carried out in the college for a given period of time, are sent to external auditing. The External Auditor, a qualified Chartered Accountant, will verify the records and if found any disparity, amendments will be made as per the suggestions. After making necessary corrections, the final reports and certificates are issued by the auditor. Periodical audits from the Department of Collegiate Education ensure that all the files as per rules and regulations, financial aids availed by the college, and finance regarding the schemes implemented and the payments received and transferred are properly kept and maintained. Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) of all the departments, as well as, the college library was conducted under the coordination of College IQAC.

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Answer:

The IQAC has played a crucial role in fostering a culture and quality in all academic and administrative endeavors of the college after completing the initial accreditation cycle in January 2017.

IQAC took the initiative to commence BA in English and Media Studies to enhance the multidisciplinary approach of the institution. In terms of curricular aspects, the IQAC places great emphasis on maintaining curricular flexibility by offering add-on/value-added courses that facilitate capacity building and skill development under the umbrella of the College Incubation Centre. Introducing bridge courses helped to overpass the gap between different educational stages or disciplines. By publishing the college academic calendar by CLMC, the IQAC ensures planning, preparedness, coordination, and synchronization of academic-related activities. The IQAC takes active measures to ensure the successful implementation of online teaching and learning by introducing the LMS software "Campus Genie", and registering college G-Suite account for achieving institution-based e-mail IDs, a Google Meet conferencing platform, Google classrooms, and the ability to record meetings. Additionally, the IQAC facilitated the introduction of the Integrated Library Management software (KOHA) as a part of upgrading the library's capabilities and showed keen interest to improve the utilization of the INFLIBNET facility. Setting up a FOSS Cell (Free and Open Source Software Cell) and conducting FOSS FEST in the college are great initiatives to promote the use and awareness of open source software among students and faculty. Registering as an NPTEL Local chapter helps to promote and facilitate online learning and skill development among students and faculty members. By formulating student IQACs and departmental IQACs, the overall quality assurance framework of the institution becomes more comprehensive, inclusive, and focused. By conducting academic and administrative audits, the IQAC aims to assess the strengths and weaknesses of the institution, identify areas for improvement, and implement measures to enhance the quality of education and administrative practices.

The insistence of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell for the registration of college alumni is likely aimed at creating a stronger network and fostering a sense of belonging among the college community. In the realm of Research, Consultancy, and Extension, the IQAC actively promotes the institution to organize seminars, exhibitions, and conferences at state, national, and international levels. The IQAC is keen on encouraging collaboration and signing Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs). For ensuring and enhancing the quality of education in the institution, the IQAC takes steps to speed up the Performance Based Appraisal System(PABS) for the career advancement scheme of faculty members. Also, promotes the participation of employees in FDP and other training programmes. The IQAC organized a diverse range of workshops and Faculty Development Programs (FDPs), including a hands-on training program on "e-Governance and Administrative Training", a workshop on "Mindful Life Management", "EKAM-Meditation", etc. for both faculty members and non-teaching staff. The Research Support Programme offers financial assistance to faculty members, enabling their participation in workshops and conferences to stay updated with the latest developments. The IQAC diligently conducts feedback analysis and provides recommendations for appropriate actions. The IQAC ensures the participation of the college in NIRF and AISHE.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Best Practice 1

1. Title of the practice - "Harithabham"

2. Objectives of the Practice

The primary objective is to conserve energy, safeguard the environment, and prioritize human health. Creating awareness among the public and college students is vital, empowering them to manage energy efficiently and promote conservation. Our focus also involves exploring new sustainable energy sources and innovative technologies for production and utilization. We aim to foster a participatory approach involving various agencies, uniting efforts to benefit Eramallikkara village and eventually impacting the entire state. Through collective action, we aspire to achieve a greener, healthier, and more energy-conscious future.

3. The Context

This can be analyzed under two different and independent heads.

Energy conservation

• Environmental protection

Varattar, a once thriving river used for goods transport, now faces encroachment, pollution, and reduced flow. The college, in collaboration with government agencies and clubs, conducted activities to address these issues and protect the environment.

Sree Ayyappa College has been organizing INFOFEST, an annual interdisciplinary symposium based on Energy and Environment. Many eminent personalities have been invited to talk. Students are also encouraged to present their valuable ideas on several topics.

4. The Practice

• Energy conservation activities

The Urjakiran project commenced with a formal inauguration in 2021. A signature campaign to promote energy conservation followed the minister's address at Town Hall, Chengannur. The Electronics Association encouraged students to conserve energy and manufactured LED bulbs, which were distributed to promote their use.

• Environmental protection activities

The Varattar River Rejuvenation Project began with a pollution survey and data collection from locals. Classes on waste disposal and river preservation were conducted, along with planting saplings along the banks. Walkathons, pamphlet distribution, and door-to-door awareness campaigns were organized. However, the project faced interruptions due to floods and the COVID-19 pandemic, shifting the government's focus toward public health.

From 2019 to 2023, the institution has been successful in organizing INFOFEST, an International Seminar which started of as a two-day programme and extended in 2023 to a ten-day programme.

5. Evidence of Success

The energy conservation activities succeeded with our students' determination, backed by effective marketing and technical teams. Providing quality LED bulbs and excellent customer service, we distributed them to students and residents.

6. Problems Encountered and Resource Required

- Lack of technically skilled students to do the assembling of LED bulbs
- Defective items in LED making kit turned out to be a loss since the supplier did not replace them
- Financial constraints
- Lack of time since the activities were done outside regular academic hours.
